How many teen mothers are there?

The estimated number of teen parent families in Hennepin County has fallen about 40 percent since 2002 due to declines in teen pregnancy and birth rates.

In Minneapolis in 2006, teen mothers headed an estimated 1,200 families with a total of 1,500 children. In 2005, 577 Minneapolis teens gave birth and another 400 teens were pregnant but did not give birth until 2006.

In suburban Hennepin County in 2006, teen mothers headed 831 families with a total of 962 children. In 2005, 467 suburban teens gave birth and another 300 teens were pregnant but did not give birth until 2006.

These estimates are based only on births to Hennepin County residents; they do not include teen-parent families who move into the county.


Who are the teen mothers?

Births to foreign-born teens are increasing in Minneapolis and Hennepin County


Percentage of births to foreign-born teenage mothers in Minneapolis and suburban Hennepin County 1996 to 2005



Teen parents in Minneapolis and suburban Hennepin County come from many racial and ethnic backgrounds






Birth rates to teens in Minneapolis continue to fall

Support for teen parents

School enrollment

Minneapolis Public Schools enrolled 650 pregnant and parenting teenage girls in the 2005-2006 school year. This does not include contracted alternative schools or private or charter schools.

Public assistance

At some time during 2006, 1,564 Minneapolis pregnant or parenting teens and 942 suburban pregnant or parenting teens received public assistance. Of these families, 60 percent received cash assistance and other benefits while 40 percent received non-cash assistance only.

WIC nutrition program

In 2006, 858 pregnant Minneapolis teens and 1,066 postpartum Minneapolis teen mothers were on Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) while 496 pregnant teens and 587 postpartum teen mothers in suburban Hennepin County received WIC.

Nurse home visiting

Home visiting nurses helped 449 Minneapolis teen parents with parenting education and returning to school in 2006. An additional 117 teen parents received home visiting in Bloomington, Richfield and Edina.

Child care

In 2006, 434 Minneapolis teen mothers received child care assistance (compared to 444 in 2005). In suburban Hennepin County, 306 teen mothers received child care assistance in 2006. Though most of the children of teens were enrolled in licensed child care, one in seven was in legal unlicensed family care.

Case management services

In 2006, county social workers identified 509 teen-parent families in Minneapolis and 251 in the suburbs. Some of these families received only one visit, and these may have had their needs met at that visit or may have declined further services. Social workers connected 70 percent of the teen parents with services.

Fathers of babies born to teen mothers

In 2006, 1,468 teen mothers were in the Hennepin County child support system. There was a legal father associated with 745 of these cases (51 percent). About 1 in 5 (22 percent) of these fathers were themselves teens, 59 percent were in their 20s, and the remaining 19 percent were 30 or older.



Teen parent profile

Angel and her two younger siblings had been removed from her mother's home because of her mother's chemical addiction. The three children were sent to live with their father, but it soon became clear that their father was addicted to crack. Angel was pregnant and 15 years old.

When Angel was 16, she was able to move out of her father's house into her own apartment. She accomplished this with the help of Project Solo, a City of Minneapolis program for teenage mothers. Angel is now 18 years old; she is the legal custodian of her little brother and sister, and her daughter is 3. Angel is determined to provide her daughter with the kind of life she herself never knew.

Angel trusts that she can step out into the world. This is not just a function of feeling self-reliant, but also a function of her capacity to allow other people in her life to support, encourage and help her.
